#### Correction:

Please note there were two inaccuracies in the Red Book Hints submitted in the September newsletter, Tips for Conductresses for using their staffs. Item #8 is not in the Red Book, but is a hint for Conductresses. Item #6 should read as follows: #6. When the Conductresses return to their stations from the East they will always turn into their station, turn with their staffs toward the standard, ground and place in standard. When returning from the West they will move into their stations, ground staff, and turn toward their standard on grounded staff then place staff in standard.

#### PRAYER CIRCLE:

The Prayer Circle during our initiation ceremony is very impressive to our new members. The following are a few tips to help officers know what they are to do. First, the Worthy Patron gavels up the Chapter and the Worthy Matron should quickly descend the dais and pass the new members. The Conductresses then countermarch so the new members can watch the formation of the Prayer Circle. Once the Chaplain enters the circle all officers join hands and this is the cue for the Conductresses to walk forward with the new members into the circle. The Conductresses join hands with Adah and the Worthy Matron but not with the new members at this time. When the Chaplain prays and states the "Golden Chain thus lengthened" the Conductresses join hands with the new members and everyone bends their arms at the elbow with hands in the air. Starting with the Worthy Matron's right hand, each hand drops and the members place them in the attitude of prayer. As soon as the prayer is over and the response "So may it ever be" is said, all members drop hands to their sides and they remain at their sides while singing. Once

## **Chicken Soup for the Heart?**

As far back as the 12th century, physicians have recommended chicken soup, or "Jewish penicillin" to combat cold symptoms due to its anti-inflammatory properties. In the 16th century, it continued to be common wisdom to give nourishing, restorative, light and easily digested food to the sick. There is a connection we make on a subconscious level between food and feeling better when we are sick as we grow up. Who doesn't think of their favorite comfort food that mom used to make whenever we are under the weather? As adults, we all have our go-to comfort foods when we are stressed, tired, or not feeling well. We look to these foods to provide the comfort that our mothers would provide. Over time, we build up associations between certain foods and create a connection with our homes. Warm and comforting food makes us think of home wherever we may be. In addition, meals are

a wonderful way of showing support, love and solidarity with others. The sharing of food, especially when it is home-made, is remembered long after the meal is over.

Our area Ronald McDonald houses offer an opportunity to provide families with this sense of support, love and solidarity through their Happy Meal Program. Groups of 8-12 can volunteer to provide a meal for families staying at the house. Just determine a menu, buy your ingredients, and show up at the house on your designated date. The house is equipped with all the kitchen items needed to prepare your meal. Available dates can be selected on the house website. There, you can also find out the size of the group to be expected for dinner. No food items can be brought from home. Everything needs to be prepared at the house. Houses do accept pre-prepared/frozen items that can be prepared at the house. They also will accept food from area restaurants. Don't forget to think about drinks and desserts when planning your menu. Remember, families may include young sisters and brothers, so be creative and think of food children will enjoy, and small hands will eat.

I can tell you from my own experience working with families with extended stays at the Madison Ronald McDonald house, nothing says support and "I care about you" like coming back to the house for a homecooked meal, and the opportunity to share the day with others going through the same experience. No one understands like another parent who has been there. Not having to think about where the next meal is coming from is one less thing to worry about in a day filled with concern.
