Please consider receiving your Trestleboard via email. Info on this is also available on this site. Now for some history. Henry S. Baird was the first professional lawyer to practice law in Wisconsin. One of the issues he dealt with was the establishment of civil authority in the Green Bay area.

The military was the law in the early days of settlement and there were several commanding officers who demanded obedience to their every whim. In his writings in the Wisconsin Historical society's archives, he talks of two people who were arrested for daring to land on the riverside of the fort there without the commander's explicit permission. The officer in charge was prosecuted and fined in one of the first exercises of civil authority in the district. Civil Law was established by the U.S. congress in 1824, the same year that Bird moved to the Green Bay area. More on this next month.
